PLEASE NOTE: Embarkation and disembarkation locations may be subject to change. Please check your booking details carefully.

Flights and Transfers

[Domestic flights](#) to and from San Cristóbal are not included in the liveboard price.

We provided a complimentary transfer between San Cristóbal Airport or local hotels and Galapagos Master on embarkation and disembarkation days only.

If you are staying on San Cristóbal Island before your liveboard, please let us know your hotel name; our staff will meet you at your hotel in the morning on embarkation day to pick up your luggage and will inform you of the arrangements for the afternoon transfer to the boat.

Advice on International Flights

We suggest booking international flights into and out of Quito, Mariscal Sucre International Airport (UIO) in Ecuador; you can use Guayaquil International Airport if it is more convenient.

We strongly recommend arriving in Ecuador one day before your liveboard departure date to ensure you are well-rested before the start of the cruise, and stay an additional night after to allow for possible domestic flight schedule changes or delays which could lead to you missing your international departure.

If you do not wish to stay in Galapagos or Ecuador for additional nights after disembarkation, please book an evening departure for your international flight to allow plenty of time for the domestic arrival and international check-in.

We offer a range of [domestic flights](#) with preferential rates and airport assistance. We can also book hotels and excursions in the Galapagos Islands or on the mainland to extend your Ecuadorian experience before and/or after your liveboard.

Visa and Passports

Your passport must be valid for at least 6 months beyond the period you intend to stay in Ecuador.

Nationals of most Western and Asian countries are permitted entry into Ecuador without a visa, for stays of up to 90 days. However, we advise guests to check their own government's travel advice website or with their nearest Ecuadorian embassy or consulate for eligibility and the most up-to-date information. Nationals of countries not included in Ecuador's visa exemption scheme must obtain a visa before travelling.

Chinese Passport holders

On 18th June 2024, the Ecuadorian Government announced the suspension of the visa waiver agreement with the People's Republic of China. Commencing 1st July 2024, all Chinese passport holders must obtain a visa to enter Ecuador before travelling.

Airport Terminal Fees & Taxes

Passengers travelling within and outside Ecuador are generally not required to pay additional airport terminal fees or departure tax as costs are normally included within your flight ticket. There are periodic postings on forums however where tickets bought from online agents do not include the taxes, so please check with your agent/ airline if it is not clear on your ticket.

Advice on Domestic Flights

Domestic flights to San Cristóbal operate from both Quito and Guayaquil.

Master Liveboards have a reserved seating allowance and preferential pricing on LATAM flights from Quito via Guayaquil which fit with embarkation and disembarkation dates and times for all guests boarding Galapagos Master in San Cristóbal. We recommend that you reserve your seat when confirming your liveboard booking to take advantage of our fixed preferential pricing and service which includes airport assistance, priority check-in and an increased checked luggage allowance of 2 x 23 kg.

Please refer to our [Domestic Flight Information](#) sheet, or contact our reservations team for further details and current pricing. We can also book other flights into the islands if you wish to extend your stay; please enquire for details via dive@masterliveboards.com.

Our airport representative will also assist guests who have booked their flights through us in obtaining their TCT card* which is required before flight check-in.

Please be advised that *we are only able to offer airport and check-in assistance for guests who have booked their domestic flights through Master Liveboards.*

*TCT / INGALA Transit Control Card is not included in the flight price.

The cost of the Transit Card, which is mandatory for all travellers to the Galapagos Islands, is 20 USD per person and is payable in cash only at the INGALA booth at Quito or Guayaquil Airport.

PLEASE NOTE: Tickets booked through Master Liveboards will be issued no earlier than 14 days before the inbound flight departure date.

Galapagos National Park Entrance Fees

Upon arrival at the airport in San Cristóbal (or Baltra), each person must pay the mandatory entrance fee of 100 USD* in cash only.

*Galapagos National Park Fees *will increase to 200 USD from 1st August 2024.*

If you are travelling with medication, please bring your physician's prescription with you.

Insurance

Insurance which covers scuba diving is mandatory aboard all Master Liveboards vessels. Your insurance must cover all of your scuba diving and snorkelling activities, including the costs for recompression chamber treatment and emergency air evacuation. We therefore strongly recommend purchasing diving-specific insurance to cover any diving-related eventuality.

All guests are also required to carry full travel and cancellation insurance, as outlined under section 3 of our [Terms and Conditions](#). We cannot be held liable for delays occurring during the cruise, nor any delays or cancellations of flights, accommodations, or tours and transfers that we organise on your behalf.

We strongly recommend insurance that covers trip curtailment and missed dives which may occur in the event of a diving-related incident requiring the boat to return to Santa Cruz. (Please refer to the [Diving Emergencies](#) section for further information).

IMPORTANT:

Travel health insurance is a mandatory requirement for entry into Ecuador. All foreign tourists are required to have travel health insurance which covers the entire duration of their intended stay in the country. **Travellers who are unable to provide proof of insurance may be denied entry.**

Master Liveboards act as a referrer for DiveAssure who offer dive and travel insurance policies, including short-term and multiple-trip policies. Their comprehensive 'Dive & Travel Plus' plan has been specifically developed for diving liveboard holidays and covers expenses in the event of missing your liveboard departure due to flight delays or missed connections, and also provides cover for lost diving days if for any reason the boat is required to abort the cruise; for instance, due to a guest injury, mechanical breakdown of the ship, air supply failure, inclement weather conditions, etc.

Diving Information

Diving in the Galapagos can be challenging, even for experienced divers. There are often tough conditions and strong currents at certain dive sites which may require a negative entry and make the diving **unsuitable for entry-level divers**, or for those who have not dived in similar conditions before.

Due to the strength of currents, the last dive of the day must be made with plenty of daylight to ensure your safety and that of your fellow divers. Therefore, there are **no night dives** offered.

Technical diving and dives which exceed recreational no-decompression limits are not allowed due to the remoteness of the Galapagos Islands, local diving regulations, and insurance requirements.

Dive Guides

Under local regulations, *all guests are required to dive with a guide*. Additionally, rebreather divers may only dive with a dedicated rebreather guide and remain within the recreational, no-decompression dive limits and times specified for open-circuit divers.

We regret that ***we are unable to provide support or guides for individuals wishing to dive with a rebreather*** on our standard Galapagos itineraries. However, in some circumstances, and with enough advance notice, it may be possible to make arrangements for groups of rebreather divers for which additional charges will apply.

Guests' Level of Diving

It is **MANDATORY** for guests wishing to participate in Galapagos Master scuba diving activities to have a minimum of **PADI Advanced Open Water** certification, or equivalent, with **at least 50 logged dives**, and should also have experience and be comfortable diving in currents.

You will need to provide copies of your certification card(s) when completing your pre-embarkation [API](#) and may also be asked to show them, and a record of your logged dives, as proof of experience when you board.

Any guests who do not meet the minimum mandatory certification and experience requirements, or who the crew feel have insufficient experience or skills to dive safely in certain conditions, may be denied participation in some or all dives during the liveaboard.

PLEASE NOTE: We are unable to offer any diving certification courses on Galapagos Master.

If you have any questions or concerns regarding the diving conditions or suitability for you, please contact our reservations team.

Non-Divers

Although some areas of the Galapagos Islands are suitable for snorkelling, the majority of sites visited on Master the Galapagos itineraries have strong currents, high surge and sharp rocks in the shallows near the islands making them hazardous for swimming or snorkelling. Additionally, it is either prohibited or not viable to go onto the islands in most areas of the Galapagos, except where we have scheduled land tours included as part of the itinerary.

Fit to Dive

All divers are responsible for ensuring that they are fit to dive and are required to provide a completed medical statement before their liveaboard departure. ***Guests who are taking medication, or have any medical conditions or symptoms that could be restrictive to diving need to obtain a doctor's evaluation and clearance to dive before embarkation.*** As this may not be possible in the destination we strongly advise guests to do so before travelling.

The medical statement is available in English, German, Mandarin and Spanish and can be downloaded from the Master Liveaboards' website at www.masterliveaboards.com/forms.

If you are unable to complete the medical statement as instructed, or provide a current doctor's certificate (less than a year old) clearing you to dive, you accept that you will not be able to take part in scuba diving activities on the liveaboard you have booked with us.

Diving Safety

Use of a dive computer and safety sausage (SMB) is compulsory on Galapagos Master. We provide surface marker buoys free of charge to all divers in case of separation.

All divers are responsible for their own dive profiles, must stay within the limits of their certification and dive computer, follow the dive guides' instructions and advice, and make a safety stop before surfacing from each dive.

Diving Emergencies

In the unlikely event that a diving-related accident occurs while in the Galapagos, there is a hyperbaric chamber in Puerto Ayora on Santa Cruz Island that operates a 24-hour emergency service with physicians, EMTs, chamber operators and patient attendants. The chamber facility is part of the international SSS Recompression Chamber Network and all personnel are trained in hyperbaric medicine by accredited international associations. The clinic has the latest technology and operates under rigorous international regulations and safety standards.

Medical-grade Emergency Oxygen is available on board, which will be administered by our crew in suspected DCI cases. Should recompression treatment be required, depending on the location of Galapagos Master at the time, and under the advice of the emergency services, transfer to the chamber may be by speedboat with costs needing to be covered by the patient (or their insurance). However, in most instances, Galapagos Master will return to Santa Cruz, which can take up to 20 hours from Darwin.

We strongly urge all guests to always dive well within recognised limits, follow dive guides' advice and have dive-specific insurance which covers emergency evacuation, recompression chamber and medical treatment costs.

It is your responsibility to ensure that your insurance will fully cover and reimburse all evacuation costs as well as recompression chamber and/or hospital treatment. We strongly urge all guests to purchase specific dive insurance which includes trip curtailment and missed dives before their trip.

As per our [Terms & Conditions](#), adequate **dive insurance and travel insurance** are mandatory.

Flying after Diving

Current studies indicate you should wait at least 18 hours before flying after multiple days of repetitive diving; However, we recommend 24 hours. Please bear this in mind when booking your outbound domestic flights.

Water Temperatures

Water temperatures across the archipelago range from 17°-26°C (62°-79°F) with a difference of several degrees between the southern areas and the north around Wolf & Darwin, and the coolest months being July - November.

Thermoclines are to be expected and temperatures can drop below 15°C (59°F) in some areas; We advise **bringing suitable additional thermal protection**, including a hood and vest to wear underneath your wetsuit. We also recommend the use of gloves to help keep you warm and to reduce the chance of stings or cuts if you need to hold on to rocks in strong currents.

Diving Equipment

Essential items to bring to Galapagos:

- Gloves (to hold on to rocks in current).
- Hood (water temperatures can drop to 15°C or lower)
- Vest (with or without hood) or extra thermal layers
- 20m - 30m reel for SMB deployment in currents

We do not recommend or sell reef hooks - the currents are too strong!

Rental Equipment

A 12 Litre (80 cu ft) cylinder, SMB, weight belt and weights are provided free of charge.

15 Litre (100 cu ft) cylinders are available by special request for an additional cost, which must be pre-booked.

All rental equipment is subject to availability and **must be pre-ordered** as it is not stored on the boat. Equipment rental costs can be viewed under 'Extras' on the Galapagos Master page of our website: www.masterliveboards.com/boats/galapagos-master.

We have a range of wetsuit, BCD, fins and boot sizes available which are kept in a storage facility onshore and brought onboard as required for each trip; In some cases, we may need to rent items from a local dive shop if demand exceeds our stocks. ***We can not guarantee items or sizes will be available if they have not been pre-booked.***

Rental wetsuits are 7mm full-length which can be used in conjunction with your own exposure equipment.

Guests should bring gloves and hoods with them as they are not available to rent onboard.

It is imperative that any guests wishing to use rental equipment let us know well before their arrival. Please inform us of your requirements when confirming your liveaboard booking.

Destination Information

Time Zone:

- The local time on the mainland of Ecuador is 5 hours behind UTC/ GMT
- The Galapagos Islands are an extra hour behind, i.e. UTC/ GMT -6hrs

Money Matters

The local currency in Ecuador is the US Dollar (USD). Larger hotels, resorts, shops and restaurants will usually accept Visa and MasterCard, although smaller ones do not. Please be aware that, in some cases, you may be asked to pay a service charge for credit card handling which can range from 4% - 10%.

PLEASE NOTE: *We are unable to accept credit or debit card payments on Galapagos Master.*

Please ensure you bring sufficient USD cash to cover the cost of your Transit Control Card, Galapagos National Park Entrance Fees and other sundry items as well as onboard extras that have not been paid for in advance and crew gratuities.

Language and Religion

The primary language spoken in Galapagos is Spanish; on the mainland, the indigenous language, Quechua, is also widely spoken.

The population is 80% Catholic with the remainder being 10% protestant and 10% mostly atheist or agnostic. There is a resurgence of native belief systems that revere Pacha Mama (Mother Earth) and emphasise the harmonious coexistence with nature.

All Dive and Safety briefings on Galapagos Master are conducted in English, although the crew also speak Spanish. If you or any of your group do not speak or understand either language, please let us know.

Climate

The Galapagos Islands straddle the equator and are affected by trade winds and the Humboldt Current which means the year is roughly divided into two seasons; 'warm' and 'dry'.

Warm season generally begins in December extending through to the end of May/early June and is quite tropical with cloudy skies, rain showers and daytime temperatures averaging 23°C (75°F). Dry season is June to November and slightly cooler with temperatures averaging 21°C (70°F) and localised rain showers generally confined to the highlands of the larger islands. Evenings are marginally cooler but can drop to just 15°C (59°F).

Health

There are two hospitals in the Galapagos Islands, although services are limited and the facilities are unsophisticated. We recommend taking sensible precautions with local food to prevent stomach upsets, drinking either boiled or bottled water only whilst on land and bringing electrolytes to help stay hydrated.

We also advise guests who are prone to motion sickness to bring preventative medication with them. However, many over-the-counter products can cause drowsiness so please check the possible side-effects of any motion sickness tablets you intend to bring.

Please also bring insect repellent and cover exposed skin to prevent insect-borne diseases.

IMPORTANT: It is a *mandatory requirement for all foreign tourists entering Ecuador to have travel health insurance* which covers the entire duration of their intended stay in the country.

Vaccinations

We advise all guests to ensure that routine vaccinations such as MMR (measles, mumps and rubella) diphtheria, tetanus and polio are up to date before travel. Hepatitis A, Hepatitis B and Typhoid vaccinations are recommended for some travellers but not mandatory.

It is your responsibility to ensure that you have had all of the required vaccinations for the countries you will be visiting. Please contact your health adviser, pharmacy, or nearest travel clinic at least 8 weeks before departure for the latest advice if you are unsure which vaccinations you need.

If you have been in a country affected by yellow fever within six days of arriving in Ecuador, you will need an International Certificate of Vaccination for yellow fever to be allowed entry into the country. It is also recommended for those intending to travel east of the Andes.

Drones

Drones may be brought into the Galapagos Islands BUT, *their use by tourists is not allowed anywhere in the archipelago*. The use of drones is only allowed under strict regulations for research and monitoring purposes, or with a special permit for commercial use.

Trip Information

Advanced Passenger Information (API)

There are certain details that we require for flight reservations and our administrative purposes before guests travel. All guests are required to submit the necessary information via our secure online portal at www.masterliveboards.com/portal.

Forms

It is a requirement for all guests to complete the following forms before or upon arrival on board: medical statement, liability releases, and safe standard practice statement, which can be found at www.masterliveboards.com/forms.

To save some time, and to ensure you have no pre-existing conditions that could affect your diving, you can download the forms from the above link, fill them in, and bring them with you. By completing and signing the forms, you are confirming that you have read, understood, and agree to the conditions outlined in the forms.

If you cannot complete the forms as instructed, you accept that you may not be able to take part in certain aspects of the holiday you booked with us.

Life on Board

Accessibility

Due to the layout of the boat, Galapagos Master may provide challenges, or be unsuitable for guests with limited mobility, and is generally not suitable for wheelchairs. Please contact us for further details if you have any questions or concerns.

Accommodation

The maximum capacity on Galapagos Master is 16 guests in 8 double occupancy cabins. Single occupancy may be available on request and is subject to a supplemental charge.

Cabin Facilities

All cabins have individually controllable air-conditioning and private en-suite bathrooms with centrally heated hot water. Other facilities include a hairdryer, towels and bathrobes.

NOTE: Guest cabins do not have lockable safety boxes/mini safes. However, your valuables can be sealed in large envelopes and locked in the safe in the captain's cabin for the duration of your time on board.

Electricity

Power outlets on Galapagos Master are mostly US style, 3-pin (Type B) at 220V and 110V. There are also 2 pin sockets in the camera preparation and charging areas which fit US Type A plugs and European Type C and F.

There are no plug adapters available onboard so you will need to bring your own if your equipment has UK, Australian or other European-style plugs.

Food and Drink

Meals are provided on a full board basis including a light breakfast, full breakfast, lunch and dinner served buffet style in the indoor dining area. A complimentary selection of carbonated soft drinks*, fruit juices and teas are also available as well as instant and freshly brewed coffee. Guests may also select beer, wine, or spirits from the bar for an additional charge.

***PLEASE NOTE: DIET SODAS ARE NOT AVAILABLE IN GALAPAGOS**

Due to the government ban on plastics, **it is not possible to get Diet Coke, Coke Zero, Coke Light, Diet Pepsi, or any other diet sodas** in the Galapagos Islands. They may be available in a few places on the mainland but, as they are not produced in returnable glass bottles, they are not available in Galapagos.

We produce our own purified water on board Galapagos Master; we recommend the use of electrolyte powders to ensure adequate hydration and advise bringing some with you as they are not available on the boat.

We offer a choice of International and locally inspired cuisine and can usually cater to most special dietary requirements with advance notice. Should you have any specific dietary needs or allergies, please advise your sales consultant at the time of confirming your liveboard trip to ensure we are able to make provisions for your needs.

Please be aware that it can be very difficult if not impossible to find sugar substitutes such as Splenda, Equal, Sweet 'n' Low, etc., as well as low-fat or soya products and some other special dietary items that are common elsewhere, particularly for vegans.

While it is usually possible to get coconut milk, soya milk, almond milk, a variety of legumes and small vegan bites, **the following VEGAN items can NOT be found in Galapagos:**

- Portobello mushrooms
- Vegan cheese
- Vegan breads/pastries
- Vegan 'meats'
- Vegan yoghurt is NOT allowed in Galapagos.

It is also not possible to find Gluten Free cookies

We always do our best to accommodate dietary requests although we require plenty of advance notice to do so. Guests with very specific needs should consider bringing some of their preferred processed food items or snacks if the lack thereof may constitute a health risk, or seriously compromise your enjoyment of your holiday.

Please note however that ***you can not bring seeds, fresh fruit, plant materials or unprocessed food products into the islands.*** Everything will be x-rayed by Galapagos National Park Authority personnel at Quito or Guayaquil airport and again upon arrival at San Cristobal or Baltra Airport and prohibited items will be confiscated.

Clothing and Footwear

Dress on board is very casual and most guests feel comfortable in little more than swimwear, shorts and t-shirts. A sweater is advised for cooler nights, particularly after multiple dives. Galapagos Master is equipped with laundry facilities and our housekeeper is happy to launder your clothes during the trip for a nominal fee of 1.00 USD per item irrespective of size/weight.

We request that guests respect the wishes of others by donning clothing for meal times. Most guests prefer bare feet on board the vessel; however, island visits may require sturdy sandals, comfortable walking shoes, or cross-trainers (sneakers).

Staying connected

Most mobile phones with 'roaming' enabled, or a locally purchased SIM card, will function periodically during your cruise. However, signal strength can be very weak in many locations and some areas have no signal at all. Many of the sites visited during the Galapagos Master liveboard itineraries are very remote and mobile phone connectivity is intermittent at best.

Galapagos Master is equipped with Starlink allowing wi-fi internet access for guests who wish to remain connected for the duration of their liveboard itinerary. Access packages can be

purchased on board only and cost 40 USD per guest for 7 nights or 60 USD for 10 nights. Each person purchasing a package can connect up to 3 devices and data is unlimited.

PLEASE NOTE: This is only available onboard and cannot be pre-booked or pre-paid.

We have satellite phone communication on the boat which can be used by guests in the event of an emergency, which will be charged at a per-minute rate.

Underwater Photography and Videography

Galapagos Master is equipped with specialised features for underwater photographers and videographers which include:

- Indoor and outdoor workstations for the preparation and maintenance of cameras.
- Individual storage drawers for cameras and peripheral items.
- Large rinsing tanks with frequently changed fresh water.

Our crew are thoroughly trained in the handling of delicate camera equipment and will bring your cameras to/ from the tenders for you.

Smoking

Smoking on board is permitted in designated outdoor areas only.

Fishing

Fishing is NOT permitted on Galapagos Master.

Environmental considerations

All visitors and operators in the Galapagos Islands must comply with the National Park Rules, which can be found in the downloads section of the Master Liveboards website, or directly using this link: [Galapagos National Park Rules](#)

We respectfully ask our guests to consider the following to help with our mission to reduce our environmental impact in the Galapagos Islands.

Batteries

We advise bringing extra batteries with you, especially if your equipment requires a unique battery size or is likely to need a lot of replacements during your trip. We also request you take spent batteries home to be recycled or disposed of properly. Alternatively, **consider using rechargeable batteries** as there are plenty of sockets to plug in a charger on board.

Drinks Bottles

We do not provide any drinks in plastic bottles on board Galapagos Master. If you own a sports bottle please bring it with you, or you can purchase one on board. If you don't have one and you don't want to purchase one, we have plenty of cups on board that you can use to ensure you remain well hydrated.

Additionally, due to the Galapagos Islands restriction on plastics, ***we are unable to offer Diet Coke, Coke Zero or any other diet sodas*** as they are not available in recyclable glass bottles.

Plastic bags and wrappers

To comply with the Ecuadorian Government's ban on single-use plastics in Galapagos, we do not provide plastic bags for purchases made on board, although reusable canvas bags are available for sale. Please help in our mission to reduce plastic waste by removing plastic wrappers and packaging from new items before travelling. If you bring plastic bags with you please reuse them and take them home.

Toiletries & Sunscreens

We kindly ask that guests consider the type of products they are bringing with them and, where possible, bring environmentally-friendly toiletries and reef-safe sunscreens for use on board, and to take partially or unused products home with them.

If you are bringing cotton buds (Q-tips) with you, please avoid the types that have plastic stems. There are many such products available which use unbleached paper or bamboo instead of plastic and are therefore much more environmentally friendly.

Payments on Board

PLEASE NOTE: *We are unable to accept any card payments on Galapagos Master.*

Please ensure you bring sufficient USD cash with you to cover any onboard extras that have not been paid for in advance as well as crew gratuities and other incidental charges.

Onboard extras and payments

Additional charges for items such as laundry, alcoholic drinks, and Galapagos Master merchandise, as well as equipment and nitrox which have not been paid for in advance, can be paid **on board in cash only.**

To reduce the amount of cash you will need to bring with you, we strongly recommend paying for equipment rental and nitrox in advance.

All prices on board are quoted in USD and payment is preferred in USD, although we can also accept Euro and GBP. However, due to extremely unfavourable bank exchange rates in the Galapagos, we strongly suggest that you **only bring USD cash** with you for any extra payments and crew tips on board and on land.

Tipping

We believe that tipping is a matter of personal choice. Should you feel that your crew has made your holiday extra special then a tip is always appreciated. Crew and guides are dedicated to ensuring your safety and enjoyment throughout your time in Galapagos, and work extremely hard night and day to do so.

If you would like to show your thanks for all their hard work, you can leave a tip in the envelope provided. Please hand this directly to the Captain. All gratuities are divided equally between the eleven crew members including the dive guides.

If you are unsure how much to tip, other liveaboards in Galapagos typically propose a figure around 10% of the cruise cost which, in our case, is approximately 100 USD per day.

Safety on Board

Emergency Management & Equipment

Galapagos Master crew members undergo rigorous training in emergency management procedures and the vessel is equipped with many modern safety features such as automated life rafts, EPIRB (Emergency Position Indicating Radio Beacon), satellite communication, fire fighting and detection systems and emergency pumps.

A thorough boat briefing will be provided by your Cruise Director at the start of your trip during which all guests will be requested to participate in a life jacket drill. Further practice scenarios may be performed during your cruise to assist our crew in keeping their skills sharp.

First Aid

Galapagos Master is equipped with a fully stocked medical first aid kit for treating minor injuries and ailments as well as for assisting trained medical professionals in remote locations. There is a full complement of medical-grade oxygen which can be administered to divers through DAN kits or unit-specific attachments. You will also find on board an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) which has been proven to greatly increase the survival rate in the eventuality of cardiac fibrillation.

Our dive team are all qualified emergency responders. Should you feel unwell at any point during your cruise, please seek the advice of your cruise director who will be able to assist you.

CCTV on board

As part of our commitment to the safety and security of our guests and crew members, all Master Liveboards vessels are equipped with CCTV cameras which are located in the following areas on each vessel:

- Engine room
- Dive platform
- Dive deck
- Sun deck
- Corridors
- Galley (kitchen)
- Communal indoor area(s), i.e. salon, camera prep area

We wish to assure all guests that the placement of all CCTV cameras is for the safety of all on board and that they are not set up or intended to invade privacy in any way.

Quito-Guayaquil-Quito Devil's Nose Adventure

The journey from Quito to Guayaquil (or vice versa) is one of the most spectacular train journeys in the world, which re-opened in June 2013 after years of renovations. Dating back to the late 19th century, the line runs from Quito, high in the Andes, all the way to lowland Guayaquil on the Pacific coast, and connecting the Valley of the Volcanoes with the infamous Nariz del Diablo (Devil's Nose) - one of the steepest stretches of railway in the world.

The trains themselves offer a luxury travel experience, with dining cars, a lounge with large windows, as well as open carriages for passengers to experience the landscape to the fullest.

The trip along the entire length of the line takes four days/three nights, with time for excursions en route and accommodation included. There are also shorter options available; there is the opportunity to join in for only selected parts of the line if your time is limited.
